I would like to thank each new and returning member for the decision you made to become or remain a part of the Poughkeepsie Branch. Your commitment and support are instrumental to furthering the AAUW mission of advancing equity for women and girls.

As we usher in the new membership year and gear up for many branch activities to resume, the question that is probably foremost on members' minds is how we will handle meetings. At this time, we continue to ask all members to adhere to New York State COVID-19 guidelines when gathering in-person for AAUW-related offerings, including interest group and community service initiative meetings. Since its inception in 1881, the organization's advocacy efforts have been a driving force behind many landmark achievements, including the Equal Pay Act passed in 1963; the Family and Medical Leave Act in 1993; the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act in 2009; and most recently the Paycheck Fairness Act which passed the U.S. House of Representatives in 2019 but is waiting for action in the Senate. Moreover, passage of the Title IX amendment is also listed among these accomplishments and advocates will celebrate its 50th anniversary next June.

So, while we will see a change in leadership at the national level when Kimberly Churches steps down as AAUW CEO in October, we should anticipate messaging over the coming months about the organization's birthday milestone and ways we can help shape the course ahead.

I look forward to seeing many of you throughout the year.

PUBLIC POLICY

I hope all of you had an enjoyable summer traveling, visiting family, or just simply relaxing. It is now September, and AAUW is back in full swing with a full and exciting agenda. In the Public Policy area, I have a few items to mention at this time.

First, several of our members who are talented seamstresses, knitters, crocheters, artists, and crafters have come forward to



volunteer to create items for the DAY ONE Early Learning Communities initiative that we have supported. One photo shows members of the Pins and Needles interest group, Mary Coiteux, Pat Luczai, Pat

Reilly and Darlene Yerdon, working on the playscape curtain they created for DAY ONE. The coordinator of this group, Mary Ann Williams, took the photo and organized this delightful work party. The other photo is the finished product. Several other AAUW Poughkeepsie members have created puppets, knitted hats,



and donated household play items that the children can use safely. Both Betty Harrel and I are collecting these items and will deliver them to DAY ONE'S temporary location on Main Street in Poughkeepsie. In addition, as I've mentioned before the Leading to Reading initiative collected and donated books for DAY ONE to distribute during the summer at the Saturday family events sponsored by the City of Poughkeepsie. These outreach efforts affect our communities in a positive way, and DAY ONE has communicated to us its gratitude with all that we have done and will continue to do.

Secondly, continuing on the theme of child care, New York State will administer nearly \$1.1 billion in federal funding directly to child care providers. This funding comes through the American Rescue Plan Act and the Coronavirus Response and

Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act. This money will help stabilize the industry and enable more parents to return to the workplace full time. It will also provide direct support to child care programs and help replenish losses these organizations experienced during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Thirdly, I want to encourage you to sign up for AAUW's Two-Minute Activist, if you haven't already. When you sign up, you'll receive information and calls for action about upcoming legislation aligned with the organization's mission and goals: equal pay, family leave, stopping sexual harassment, equality in education and more. Little Libraries are coming!



Once again, Leading to Reading is moving in a new direction! Thanks to help from Marlene Straus, Leading to Reading volunteer, and Peggy Kelland, Wappingers Central School District board member, the new libraries will be installed on the grounds of five Wappingers elementary schools and the Astor Early Learning Center in Poughkeepsie. Future plans include installations at some of the Poughkeepsie City Schools as well.

There is a national network of Little Libraries and some are springing up around our area. Poughkeepsie City Councilman Chris Petsas has been installing them at city parks over the past year. The Leading to Reading boxes, which look like birdhouses, are being built and installed by a Boy Scout as his Eagle Scout project. Books will be provided by the Friends of the Poughkeepsie Public Library District and AAUW members will keep the sites updated with books for children and families to take or share.

November Program: Leaving Home/Finding Home

For the last few years, AAUW Poughkeepsie has collaborated with the Poughkeepsie Library BIG READ Program by designing one of our monthly Membership Meeting presentations around their annual theme. We are pleased to be able to do that once again this year.



For 2021, the Library has chosen the graphic novel, "The Best We Could Do" by Thi Bui, an illustrated memoir of a family's journey from their wartorn home in Vietnam to America. It explores the anguish of immigration and the lasting effect displacement has on a child.

Based on this theme, our November Program will feature the stories of three

local women as they share with us their own impressions and struggles as children coming to a new home. Each unique story will give us insight as to why their families emigrated, what it was like for them to leave their homes, and how their lives have been impacted.

How fortunate we are that our three storytellers will include our own member and facilitator, Wendy Maragh Taylor, who will be joined by Diana Cruz and Christine Wang. You can read more about them in the October Branch. Their stories will be followed by a question and answer period and discussion.

As usual, members of AAUW will receive an invitation to this Virtual event to be held on November 11, 2021 from 7PM-8:30PM. We hope you will join us for what promises to be a fascinating, insightful and timely look into the experience of immigration.
