EQUAL RIGHTS IS (BACK) ON THE BALLOT!



Join us on October 10 to learn more about the New York State Equal Rights Amendment Ballot Initiative that will be on the November ballot. Our speaker will be Cindy Lanzetta, board member of The League of Women Voters of the Mid-Hudson Region (LWVMHR) and chair of the ERA Task Force.

The New York State Equal Rights Amendment is an amendment to New York's State Constitution that adds explicit protections against discrimination based on a person's ethnicity, national origin, age, disability and sex, including sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy and pregnancy outcomes. It would also protect against any government actions that might affect a person's access to reproductive health care.

It's Really About Dessert

While many avoid political discussions with the opposition, there are safe ways to engage in "meeting the candidates" and understand opposing points of view. We can respect an opinion but not agree with it. "We can agree to disagree." Hostess a small gathering or go out to dinner where all agree to discuss issues important to women and how the candidates have responded to those issues. Don't try to persuade anyone to change their minds; be open to the discussion and the research. Knowledge of all sides is not a dangerous thing. Your vote is your political voice and you have freedom of speech at the ballot box. So what is your menu?

Amuse bouche: Are your candidates in favor of funding private, parochial and charter schools that do not adhere to the same civil rights and accountability standards as required of public schools? What were the standards in their home states?

Appetizer: How do your candidates support equal pay and equity? Do they understand middle and lower class economic struggles? Are they associated with legislation on state or federal levels to assure the salary gap closes and all have access to benefits and a protected pension?

Main Course: What are your candidates' positions on an individual's rights to determine his/her own health decisions such as treatment, access to medication and reproductive rights? What experience do your candidates have managing and advancing social programs such as Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid? Do they want to work with the current systems or do they prefer alternative privatized programs?

Dessert: Commit to vote. Vote for a candidate, not against a candidate. If needed, procure an absentee ballot. Participate in early voting opportunities. Make voting a celebration of women's suffrage. America will tally the votes and learn the tenor of the majority and minority and strive to unite them. Win or lose, let your voice be recorded.

DCC SCHOLARSHIPS

Our branch awarded two scholarships to women graduating from Dutchess Community College. An AAUW endowment in the DCC Foundation supports one, and member donations and branch funds are used to fund the second scholarship. Presentations were made at the DCC Foundation Luncheon honoring all scholarship recipients.

Amani Deloatch

made the Dean's list all four semesters, started a student club called Active Minds to advocate for student mental health awareness, and received a Dutchess United Educators



award for academic excellence while promoting student voice and advocacy. She describes herself as feeling hopeless and doubtful of receiving a college education. She survived the death of her eldest brother to gun violence, watched her parents struggling to provide for a family of eight, and dropped out of college twice due to the financial burden. She plans to continue her education at SUNY Brockport working toward a degree in social work. She said, "I am truly honored to receive this award as it reflects a strong group of successful women coming together to support a first-generation African American woman in reaching her educational goals."

Mackenzie Ean

debated continuously about attending college and went through a tumultuous time after graduating from high school. After working with young children, she found her passion and decided that she wanted



to obtain a degree in Elementary Education. She hoped to be a positive light in their early lives and have a lasting impact on their academics. She struggles with a work-school balance and has to fully support herself. She stated, "This scholarship will lessen the financial burden upon my shoulders and provide evidence of my accurate choice in re-attending college." She has hoped to teach children since she was a young child and feels that the financial struggles will be worthwhile.

We hope to maintain contact with these two young women as they continue their academic careers!

NCCWSL Scholarship Recipient

Marist College student, Lily Hardwick, received the Irene Keyes Memorial Scholarship to attend the National Conference for Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL).



Here she shares her experience:

It has been such an honor to represent Marist College at AAUW's National Conference for College Women Student Leaders. This conference brings together hundreds of college women from across the nation for an

immersive multi-day experience of leadership training, inspiration, and networking.

As a first generation student, I had the privilege of attending the panel "Empowering First-Generation Students — Daring to Harness Your Strengths While Navigating Challenges," where I was able to hear President of Marymount University, Irma Becerra PhD, share her story. Her wisdom from the panel and later at the Women of Distinction Dinner will stay with me forever: "Invest in yourself; you owe it to yourself and your future family."

I also attended a phenomenal panel about the Equal Rights Amendment, hosted by <u>Judy A. Carbone</u> and <u>Ting Ting Cheng</u>. They are absolute leaders in pushing for the ERA to be officially recognized as the 28th Amendment.

I am so thankful for this opportunity given to me by the Poughkeepsie AAUW and to have such incredible women to look up to. To be known is to be seen.



IN MEMORIAM

Sally Edwards Taylor

Sally Edwards Taylor passed away May 29, 2024 at her Poughkeepsie, New York home. She was 91 years old. Anyone who ever met Sally knows that this quote from Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream captures her perfectly: "Though she be but little, she is fierce."



Born in Kansas City, Missouri, Sally graduated from Wellesley College and moved to Dutchess County with her husband Richard Taylor in the late 1950's.

While raising three daughters, Sally helped establish the Poughkeepsie Family Development and Day Care Center, supported Democratic party candidates, interviewed prospective Wellesley students, and served on the boards of the Day Care Center, Poughkeepsie Ballet Theatre and Grinnell Library. As her daughters entered high school Sally earned a second degree at SUNY New Paltz and began a long career as an early elementary teacher, first at St. George's School and then at the Poughkeepsie Day School.

Her community involvement continued to reflect her diverse interests; volunteering at the Bardavon Opera House, Locust Grove Estate, Mohonk Preserve, and serving as the "story lady" at the Grinnell Library for more than 40 years.

She was a long-time member of AAUW and enjoyed the *All those books...* and *Cuisine* interest groups for many years. Betty Harrel wrote, "She was very involved with the Community Family Development Day Care Center. That's how *Leading to Reading* got involved with the Children's Book Week celebrations we had there."

A Memorial Service will be held in the fall at Christ Episcopal Church in Poughkeepsie.
